IT'S GREAT TO BE A FRUITA MONUMENT WILDCAT

DRESS

The goal is to be attractive NOT distractive. When a teacher or administrator believes the student's appearance is distracting or disruptive to the educational process, the student will be referred to the Administration Office. The student will be asked to change clothes and may be subject to further disciplinary actions for repeated offense. Students are expected to exhibit respect and responsibility for the themselves and others by following the guidelines below.

Clothing, hairstyles, and accessories that will **NOT** be allowed:

- Any extreme, provocative, or immodest;
- Threaten the safety or welfare of any persons; e.g. (spikes);
- Degrade any race, creed or gender;
- Are obscene, profane/vulgar, or lewd;
- Promote tobacco, alcohol, drugs, or weapons;
- Advocate sex or sexual activity;
- Denote membership in a gang by virtue of color, arrangement, trademark, or other attributes; e.g. (including but not limited to ICP attire, hairnets and bandanas).

Specific examples of inappropriate dress include, but are not limited to:

- Clothing that exposes undergarments;
- Clothing that is transparent;
- Low cut tops that expose cleavage;
- Strapless tops, spaghetti straps, one shoulder tops, halter tops, tube tops, and muscle shirts;
- Short miniskirts or short shorts that are extremely short, provocative or immodest or clothing that includes holes in inappropriate places
- Clothing that exposes the torso including side, back or middle (this rule applies to guys as well);
- Pants that sag excessively;
- Sleepwear;
- Sunglasses.
- Teachers may request that students remove their hats in the class-room.





Frequently Asked Questions

On the test days my student will be testing, what time should they be at school? Your student should arrive at school no later than 7:20 as testing will begin promptly at 7:30 in assigned classrooms on campus. It will be critical for your student to be at their testing station on time to receive the group instructions required for each test. (PLEASE carefully note the calendar dates above).

Do busses run on the testing days? Busses will run on a regular schedule arriving to and from FMHS. When students have completed their tests they are free to leave campus. Buses will leave FMHS at 2:50pm.

Will Career Center and WCCC still be having classes during the test period? Career Center will NOT be holding classes on April 9 and 10.


WCCC will be having class both days and students can attend those classes on any day they are not testing. The busses will also run for all these students at regular times.

Will all high schools be testing on the same dates? All four high schools will be testing on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 9 and 10.

If I do not want my student to take a test, what do I do? Parents who wish to refuse state testing will be required to fill out the "Parent Request for Exemption from State Assessment Form" that is located on the D51 Website under <u>Assessment Information</u>. One exemption form per student **must** be completed and returned by the **parent** to the administration office at FMHS. If you do not complete an exemption form for your student and they are absent on the day of testing, they will be pulled from class and tested on an alternative day.

If my student is not scheduled to test, should they come to school? No. In order to properly administer each exam, we will be utilizing all staff to proctor exams and must maintain a testing environment. Teachers will not be available and the library and computer labs will be in use.
