Happy Spring Wildcats! Here in the Health Office we are gearing up for the last little bit of colds and viruses that are hanging on, as well as seasonal and other environmental allergy and air quality concerns. Parents, please continue to encourage good hand-washing and hygiene practices. Please contact us if your student has any health concerns related to allergies or asthma difficulties in the spring, including needing an inhaler or allergy medications at school.

Please remember that all medications will need to be picked up by Thursday, May 23, 2019 no later than 3:15 pm. Students are not allowed to pick these up. We DO NOT keep medications of any kind over the summer months and these will be destroyed on Friday, May 24, per school district policy. This includes prescription medications, inhalers, cough drops, liquid medications, lotions, eye drops etc. Finally, spring and summer are great times to get those missing immunizations. If you received a letter of notice for missing shots, you can take that to the doctor or health department for administration of these vaccinations. Concurrent Enrollment

Did you know that District 51 will pay the tuition for high school students to take college coursework?

This is a great opportunity for students & families to save money, get a head start on a certificate or degree path program, and learn essential college readiness skills right here in our local community!

D51 offers three types of Concurrent Enrollment programming:

Technical Scholars

Through a partnership with
Western Colorado
Community College,
students can take
advantage of college-level
Career & Technical
coursework that can help
them earn a certificate or
degree towards their
career path.

High School Scholars

Through a partnership with Colorado Mesa University (CMU), students have the opportunity to take college coursework at their home high school. Courses are taught by our D51 teachers, and vary from school to school based on staff qualifications.

Early Scholars

This is what people most often think of when they think about Concurrent Enrollment. This option allows for students to take college courses on a college campus, taught by a college professor.

Students must travel to CMU to participate.

Eligibility

- Student must be in a D51 High School and maintain Full-Time Status
- Student must have an ICAP (Individual Career & Academic Plan) that includes a post-secondary education plan to reach a desired career field
- Student must meet College Readiness Benchmarks based on the test score requirements for the class
- Student must be on track to graduate =
 - Maintaining a 2.0 GPA or higher
 - Earning a minimum of 6.0 credits per academic year
 - Working towards a proficiency option on the Colorado Graduation Guidelines Menu that aligns with a student's ICAP

Additional Details

- Students in Grade 9 can take up to 4 ICAP-related courses
- Students in Grades 10 12 can take as many ICAP-related courses as their schedule permits

Talk with your school counselor to see if this option is a good fit!

VAPING AND JUULING

What is Vaping?

Vaping is the act of inhaling and exhaling the aerosol, often referred to as vapor, which is produced by an e-cigarette or similar device. The term is used because e-cigarettes do not produce tobacco smoke, but rather an aerosol, often mistaken for water vapor, that actually consists of fine particles. Many of these particles contain varying amounts of toxic chemicals, which have been linked to cancer, as well as respiratory and heart disease.



How Do They Work?

E-Cigarettes work by heating a coil that when the Vape Juice or E-liquid, that is vaporized and then inhaled. The vaporized liquid contains metal particles from the coil as well as containing chemicals like formaldehyde when heated which can cause cancer and damage the lungs.
